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Monday, May 4, 2020 - 6:00 p.m.

1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Rich Hendler called the meeting of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board to order on May 4, 2020, at 6:06 p.m.

Present: Chair Rich Hendler, City staff: Lisa Escobedo, Parks & Recreation Director and Joyceinne Williams, Administrative Secretary

Virtually: Vice Chair Mitali Mandlekar Board Members: Cliff LeBlanc, John Hillebrand, Eric Presson, and Hillary Schwanbeck

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Board member LeBlanc moved to approve the March 2, 2020 minutes. Board member Hillebrand seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

3. REGULAR AGENDA ITEMS

3a Pedestrian Transportation Dashboard

Director Escobedo reported the pedestrian dashboard is a new form that will be posted and updated continuously on the City website which indicates progress of working projects and follows other projects as bids are received. This form will include the CIP budgeted amounts for the next five years, a list showing trails and sidewalk connectivity underway, grant applications in progress, upcoming projects, and a color coded priority category map.

A trails and sidewalks grant was submitted in May.

Senior Center/Recreation Center Update

Director Escobedo updated the City Council on the renovation proposals for the Senior Center, at the April 21, 2020 City Council Meeting. The Council agreed to move forward on the renovation. The process will include a request for professional services and hiring a consultant to assist in determining programming needs. This will take place in FY 2021 which begins October 1, 2020, with

renovations to begin in FY2022. The goals will be shared with the Board once we move forward.

The Board discussed if plans for the expansion would be included in the proposal. Director Escobedo stated after working with the consultant, the review of programming needs will determine if there is a need for expansion.

The Senior Center has been closed to the public. Staff continues to call seniors to see if the City can provide any services during this time. Meals on Wheels continue to distribute curbside lunches. Director Escobedo stated we will continue to work on opening procedures per Governor Abbott's direction. The recreational programming instructors have all chosen to wait until June to begin their summer programs.

Fall Lecture Series Discussion

Chair Rich Hendler presented several possible topics for discussion for fall lectures.

Board member LeBlanc suggested presenting a lecture on an active compost option called "Turn" which allows each household to collect their compost and drop it off at Whole Foods.

Board member Schwanbeck asked that a panel for discussion on preservation of trees be considered as a topic. She also suggested inviting the City's Urban Forester for comments.

4. REPORTS

4a. Parks and Recreation

Director Escobedo reviewed all the ongoing parks and recreation projects and upcoming events. This information was provided in the agenda packet.

Director Escobedo reported on the cancellation and postponement of all senior and parks and recreation programming, including summer camps, due to COVID-19. Plans for the coming months will depend on the direction of Governor Abbott and the City Council.

All cancellations due to COVID-19 and the ongoing park projects were provided in the agenda packet.

Board member Presson moved to adjourn the meeting, and Board member Hillebrand seconded. Motion carried unanimously, Chair Rich Hendler adjourned the meeting at 6:44 p.m.

Parks & Recreation Advisory Board Meeting

July 6, 2020 (WebEx)

Recreation

- **Summer Classes and Camps** – a few started on June 1 with increased COVID protocols, such as taking temperatures and only allowing students in for class, no more than 10 per class, or amount to assure social distancing.

Athletics

- **Canceled - Summer Volleyball League** was canceled due to COVID-19 and GCISD not allowing anyone to use their facilities.
- **Youth Sports Associations (soccer, baseball & softball)** practiced and played through June.

Tennis

- **Summer tennis leagues** –
- **Tennis Classes & Programs** – began in June

Senior Center

- **Fitness Classes** – Yoga and Jazzercise started in June with increased COVID protocols and sanitization.
- **Social activities** are still not allowed
- **Meals on Wheels** – curbside pick-up

Parks

- **Central Fire Station** – a new landscape design, irrigation, and landscape rock borders were installed. This landscape helps to add to the fire station's new paint job.
- **Sand Volleyball Pit Relocation** is still in progress, but should be finished in the next few weeks.
- **Park Restroom Projects** – the new construction of restrooms at the Nature Center and Reagan Park should start in the next few weeks. While the City Park restroom renovation was delayed due to the Firework event, will begin in July.

Pickleball in Colleyville

History and Growth

- Invented in 1965 in Seattle, WA by 3 men, including US Congressman Joel Pritchard.
- The USAPA (USA Pickleball Association) was formed in 1984 to perpetuate the growth and advancement of pickleball on a national level.
- By 1990, pickleball was being played in all 50 states.
- Between 2013 and 2019, pickleball experienced a 650 percent increase in active members.
- At the end of 2019, the USAPA was tracking 7,928 places to play in the US, which was an increase of 111 per month since the end of 2018.
- The SFIA (Sports and Fitness Industry Association) has shown an average annual player growth rate of 9.7% from 2016 to 2019.
- According to the Tennis Industry Association, tennis participation between 2010 and 2018 has fallen by 5%, but the number of play occasions during that same period is down almost 23%.

Bear Creek Park - Keller

- The City of Keller built 4 dedicated pickleball courts with lights in 2016.
- Weather permitting, all 4 courts are in use simultaneously for roughly 6-8 hours a day, 7 days a week, and for most of that time, there are people waiting to play.
- After 4 years, the city is working to build another 4 courts on the same site.

Dove Park, Grapevine

- Southlake built four dedicated pickleball courts with lights in 2019 at Dove Park.
- The park also has two tennis courts with permanent pickleball lines.
- All six of these courts are routinely being used simultaneously during both mornings and evenings.

Trophy Club

- The city of Trophy Club currently has 4 pickleball courts painted on tennis courts.
- The city is expected to vote on a proposal during the first week of July to build 8 dedicated pickleball courts at one of the city parks.

Arlington Tennis Center

- 26 outdoor, lighted tennis courts.
- Currently have 18 pickleball courts painted onto tennis courts.
- Began offering pickleball on May 1st of this year. According to the director, they are “all in” on pickleball.
- After fewer than 2 months, they now have roughly 80 pickleball players playing at their facility each day.
- Working on a plan to convert a portion of their tennis courts into at least 12 permanent dedicated pickleball courts.

Conclusion

- As the active baby boomer population continues to age and experience injuries, they will increasingly look for more “body friendly” activities, and pickleball fits this need perfectly.
- In the last year, pickleball has begun being introduced in local school districts, which will help to continue the trend toward younger participants.
- I urge the board to strongly consider building at least 4 dedicated pickleball courts. I have seen firsthand the growth of pickleball in all the communities in our immediate area, and in every case, the demand for courts has outweighed the courts available.
